

IVP Projects in Ireland

VSI hosted 17 volunteer projects (one of which was in Northern Ireland) providing volunteering opportunities to 125 people of 24 different nationalities.

In 2014 VSI organised two new projects, one in Cloughjordan, Co. Tipperary and one in Callan, Co. Kilkenny (see table for more details). VSI recruited eleven volunteer Project Coordinators for eight projects in Killarney, Mosney, Cloughjordan, Grangebeg and Glebe House.

IVP Volunteers abroad

VSI received 124 applications for projects abroad this year. 57 volunteers were placed in 24 different countries worldwide – Austria, Botswana, Croatia, Czech Republic, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Kenya, Korea, Republic of Kosovo, Russian Federation, Serbia, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Tanzania, United Republic of Ukraine, United Kingdom, United States of America and Viet Nam.

The volunteers worked in a variety of areas including the environment, work with children, people with disabilities and young people and arts and culture.

VSI organised a Preparation Workshop for outgoing volunteers in May and also met with individual volunteers. Issues covered include health and safety, child protection, intercultural learning, expectations, insurance and practical issues.

Teenage Programme

Gender Representations in Arts and Media Youth Exchange

The Gender Representations Youth Exchange in July in Cloughjordan, Co.

Tipperary involved partner organisations from Bulgaria, Estonia, Italy, Catalonia, and Ireland. Twenty four young people from 14 different nationalities all aged between 16 and 21 years participated. The group were joined by a team of 11 leaders, coordinators and facilitators for the ten-day project, which explored the topic of Gender identity and gender discrimination in media and the arts.



The project used creative methodologies such as theatre, music and multimedia to allow the young people to create responses to the messages they receive about gender on a day-to-day basis. They hosted a showcase for the community of Cloughjordan at the end of the project where they shared their songs, short films, and experiences of the project. The group also had the opportunity to host an

intercultural night, take part in team-building games and take a day trip to the Cliffs of Moher and Galway City. The project was a great success with a lot of fun and learning for all involved.



Cooperation with Palestinian youth organisations - Feasibility Visit

Delegates from Ireland, Slovenia, Scotland and Palestinian organisations in the West Bank and Israel, came together in Cloughjordan, Co Tipperary in February for a 4-day feasibility visit with the aim of building future partnerships in the area of youth work. The group of eight people took part in a series of facilitated activities

that allowed them to exchange knowledge about their individual organisations, share methods and approaches, and develop a better understanding of the specific context and challenges for Palestinian youth organisations in the region.

In addition to this, the project offered a great opportunity to raise awareness in the local community and to share individual insights into the ongoing situation in Israel / Palestine. The group visited St Michael's Primary School to talk about their home countries and share stories about their childhood there. VSI also organised a public event, "Voices from Palestine" which presented a unique opportunity for four Palestinian delegates, from Gaza, the West Bank, Israel and Ireland to share their

personal stories of conflict. Over 40 people attended this event and this was followed by a wonderful night of Palestinian –Irish music in the local bar which was enjoyed by all. It is hoped the project will lead to concrete partnerships in the future, with possibilities to develop youth projects in the long term through the new European youth programme, Erasmus+.

Paths to Inclusion Seminar March 10th - 16th in Cloughjordan, Co Tipperary



VSI hosted Paths to Inclusion an international Seminar in March last in Cloughjordan, Co Tipperary. The seminar included 40 volunteers and staff from over 16 branches and partners of SCI. The seminar explored the topic of inclusion in Youth work.

There were inputs from the NYCI and Leargas, as well

as workshops allowing the participants to share experiences, and build ideas for best practice in future projects. There were 16 different nationalities among the 40 participants including volunteers the Eastern Caucasus countries of Georgia, Abkhazia and 1 volunteer from Ukraine.

Dialogue for Change Project

The Dialogue for Change project was a six month Youth Democracy project under the Youth in Action Programme of the European Commission organised by VSI during 2014. VSI brought together many young asylum seekers (some of whom we have worked with previously) over a series of day and weekend events to enable them to build their confidence to talk about their experience of asylum seeking to politicians, journalists and interested youth and community organisations.

The project highlight was a day- long seminar in Smock Alley Theatre in Dublin in May where over 80 people attended. Dil Wickremasinghe from Newstalk Radio chaired and facilitated the event and Judge Catherine Mc Guinness from the Irish Refugee Council and Ifrah Ahmed from Somalia gave key inputs. The seminar was a great success and led to interviews on Newstalk radio and Galway Bay FM.

A final event was held in late May which brought all the young people involved in an evaluation workshop which included looking at future events for the group. The young people involved were a mix of young people already active in VSI and new participants recruited from Direct Provision Centres around the country.



Long Term Volunteering

VSI enabled 7 young people from Ireland to take part in long-term international volunteer placements through the EU supported programme - European Voluntary Service (EVS) in 2014. EVS is open to 18-30 year olds and all costs are paid by the European Commission.

Dublin Local Group 2014

The Dublin Local Group (DLG) of VSI undertakes to improve the living conditions of marginalised, elderly and disabled people living in Dublin. We mainly try to help out in situations where the living standard of a person or family has fallen well below the general standard and where they are unable to help themselves because of their physical, social or financial situation. The type of work involves cleaning, painting, de-cluttering, gardening and some small repairs.

Work requests are usually referred to us by Vincent de Paul, Friends of the Elderly, Care Local and the Social Work Departments of Dublin City Council, the Health Service Executive and all hospitals in the Dublin City Area.

We meet each Saturday morning to carry out our work. We have a meeting after each assessment visit to make decisions on jobs and discuss future projects. We also have a healthy social programme with outings and other events.

There are currently 15 active members in the DLG and we have 6 new and very committed volunteers since January. Our group is mixed in gender and age and come from all parts of the world e.g. Singapore, France, Moldavia, Korea, America.

So far this year we have received 33 requests for assistance. We have assessed 19 and completed 8.

These projects have taken place all across the city and were very varied:

- Painting the bedrooms of a family suffering from mental illness in Mulhuddart
- De-cluttering a house in Terenure for a man suffering from depression
- Cutting the grass in the front garden of a man with learning disabilities in Clondalkin

Our proudest achievement this year is in SeatTech's offices Dublin 4. SeatTech provides posture positioning and seated mobility solutions for service users based on their individual needs. Incorporating 24-hour postural management systems, the service also provides support, information and training for service users and for service providers who work for Enable Ireland or as partners in the local community. We spent 6 Saturdays (10am to 4pm) painting 3 assessment rooms, 4 hallways and the manager's office and that was one of the most rewarding projects of the year.

Our 2015 objective is to keep doing good necessary local work in a fun and enjoyable atmosphere.

Let's Move the Market EU Project focussing on youth and employment

VSI is involved in an EU wide project focussing on youth and employment with partners from Belgium, Germany, Greece, Italy and Slovenia in 2013 and 2014. The project involves each partner hosting a study visit around the main themes of the project and a local youth initiative in which young people are enabled to organise a local seminar or event on the themes of the project. VSI hosted the group in May 2014 and held a seminar 'Youth Work getting Youth Working' with Senator Jillian Van Turnout, Maria Doherty from Foroige and Vivienne Whelan and Stephen Doyle from the Wexford Youth Action Project. The group visited the Ballymun Job Centre and The Bolton Trust Docklands Innovation Park and held a mini seminar with Davie Philip from Feasta on the theme of employment and sustainability. VSI's survey of EVS volunteers is nearing completion and will be completed by January next. Kevin Sullivan has been our representative on the project and he has taken part in 2 study visits to Slovenia and Germany. The project will be completed in March next with a major seminar on the theme in Italy.



European Citizenship in the Mirror

This project brought together partners from Italy, Ireland, Nepal, Mauritius and Mexico in a year- long project combining volunteering, job shadowing and research on the theme of citizenship and social exclusion. Volunteers from Ireland and Italy travelled in teams of 2 to Mexico, Mauritius and Nepal in April of this year and carried out field research on the theme of citizenship as well as joining in local volunteering projects. VSI hosted 3 volunteers from Mauritius, Mexico and Nepal during July on volunteering projects and in research which focussed on the Traveller Community. This involved meeting many different Traveller groups. All the volunteers then came together in Greystones, Co. Wicklow in late July to discuss debate and learn about the issue of citizenship. The workshop had great inputs from peace activist Caoimhe Butterly and Ian White formerly with Glenree Centre for Reconciliation. The volunteers are now working on an e-book on the themes of their research which will be completed by January next.
