3. About Voluntary Service International

Voluntary Service International (VSI) is the Irish branch of Service Civil International (SCI), a worldwide peace movement that began after the First World War.

We are a volunteer-based movement founded in 1965 and headquartered in Dublin. For over 55 years we have promoted peace, social justice and sustainable

development at home and abroad. During that time, walls have fallen, borders have moved and the challenges facing us have changed. While many things have undoubtedly improved, there are still many of the same problems (e.g. conflict, human rights) alongside the emergence of new problems (e.g. climate change, growing inequality).

These challenges are large and multifaceted but we at VSI believe we can play a part in addressing them. At the heart of many of these problems is a lack of understanding. Of people, their backgrounds, their cultures, their own day-to-day challenges. Of the environment, its importance, its fragility, our impact on it. And the interdependence of all of these things.

The tool we have chosen to help combat this is a simple one, but we know through experience that it is a powerful one: volunteering. By bringing together volunteers from across the globe we aim to increase awareness and understanding of the people, the societies and the environment around us. This deeper understanding will contribute to a global and local society which is more open-minded, aware and responsible for its own behaviour and actions. We are able to do this with the help of our network partner organisations at home and abroad, enabling volunteering experiences that promote peace, social justice and sustainable development. In 57 years, we have achieved a lot as an organisation. We recognise that, over this time, the world has changed and that we, as VSI, need to adapt to this and the new challenges it presents.

is a world of peace, social justice and sustainable development, where all people live together with mutual respect.

Our mission

is to promote a culture of peace, social justice and sustainable development by organizing and supporting volunteering projects, both in Ireland and internationally.



Our Values

Non-violence: choosing peaceful resistance and conflict resolution without recourse to violence as a principle and a method

Human Rights: Respect for individuals as stated in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights

Solidarity: International solidarity for a more just and equitable world, and solidarity between all human beings

Respect for the Environment and the ecosystems of which we are a part of and upon which we are dependent

Inclusion: being open and inclusive of all individuals without discrimination

Empowerment: providing people with knowledge and tools to understand and act to transform the social, cultural and economic structures that affect their lives at all levels

Co-operation with local communities as well as other local, national and international partners to strengthen the positive potential within civil society as a whole

The COVID pandemic and lockdown continued for longer than we had hoped, continuing to hamper faceto-face contacts, which are central to VSI's and SCI's work. Staff, Board and volunteers continued to develop online volunteering and educational programmes and to consider how to improve our future programmes.

These programmes were made possible by the creativity and commitment of the strong staff team led by CEO Helen Walmsley. In the first part of the year, Áine Boyle was Programmes Co-ordinator, supported by two European Solidarity Corps (ESC) volunteers, Eiméar Savage (Programmes Officer) and Nicolas de Wergifosse (Communications and Marketing Officer). Senka Nenadov joined the VSI team from Serbia for two months in the summer as an ESC volunteer. Eiméar was appointed Programmes Co-ordinator in November, when Áine moved on to new adventures. Two new ESC volunteers joined the team later in the year, Seán Maguire from September and Anabelle Burova from November.

Due to COVID restrictions, we were unable to host any International Volunteer Projects ('workcamps') in Ireland during the year. We sent a small number of in-person and online volunteers to projects with our branches and partners in Europe. We continued to send and host volunteers on ESC projects, providing a variety of volunteering opportunities for young people from Ireland. Our Dublin Local Group volunteers finally resumed volunteering in 2022, following a 2-year suspension of their work due to COVID.

In 2022 we were awarded the Global Citizenship Education (GCE) grant from Irish Aid to support our volunteers to explore and engage with global issues. Through our Youth Climate Justice Fund from the

DCEDIY we supported young people to explore inequalities created by climate change and actions, to reduce inequalities and poverty. We are signatories to Comhlámh, Dóchas and IDEA codes for quality and standards and are supported by these organisations in these areas of our work. These initiatives have supported us to meet our strategic goal of reemphasising the value of volunteering for peace and to further embed our overall mission and values into our work.



I would like to thank the Board members for a very active year's work. In 2022 we were joined by our new co-Treasurers Nikita Patak and Aidan Graver. Máille Brady-Bates, Claire Devlin and Dervla King continued throughout the year. Liam Keenan did not go forward for re-election at the AGM.

In 2022 we moved to new office premises at the Carmichael centre in Dublin 7. We held our 2022 AGM inperson in our new office building and arranged for some attendees to join us online. We are pleased to have continued working with our auditors Roberts Nathan.

VSI's work would not have been possible without the support of funders and donors. Our principal sources of funding were the Youth Service Grant, Youth Capital Fund and Youth Climate Justice Fund of the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth (DCEDIY) and the European Commission (through the European Solidarity Corps (ESC) programme, administered by Léargas). We were awarded the Global Citizenship Education grant from Irish Aid and we also received a grant from the Health Service Executive. In 2022 we received project and membership fees and generous donations from members, volunteers and donors. We are grateful for the support from DCEDIY as part of the Shared Services support in accountancy and governance delivered through Bradan accountants and The Wheel, coordinated by NYCI.

We dearly miss Diarmaid McGarrigle who sadly died in August. Diarmaid worked at Glebe House, our partner and volunteer project host organisation in Strangford, Northern Ireland and devoted his life to international voluntary service.

Finally, I would like to personally thank the volunteers who are the lifeblood of VSI for their work at every level, including projects in Ireland, internationally and online.


VOLUNTEER PROGRAMMES STATISTICS

ESC Project Duration


ESC PROJECT STATISTICS

ESCs age/gender






ESC Project Destinations

INTERNATIONAL VOLUNTEER PROJECTS

International Volunteer Projects (IVPs) are a unique form of volunteering, which bring together people from different countries, cultures and backgrounds to live and work together on short-term projects with local communities in over 70 countries worldwide.

Volunteers support these communities in their long-term work for a more just, environmentally friendly and peaceful society. The projects also aim to develop the intercultural understanding of volunteers, who learn about the cultures of other volunteers in the group through discussion, themed free-time activities and cooking together.

In 2022 VSI were unable to host projects in Ireland due to COVID-19 but we were able to start sending volunteers abroad. The year 2022 was a combination of in-person and online projects. The project topics ranged from environmental protection and arts, to arranging educational activities for young people.

IVP International

In 2022, we sent 3 volunteers from Ireland to IVPs abroad. In total, these volunteers completed 5 projects in 4 different countries. The projects offered a range of different topics and activities.

- English Summer Camp in Kranjska Gora SCI Slovenia, 2 projects in the month of July. The main goal of the project was to improve children's English vocabulary and conversational English through fun, sport and creative activities.
- 2. Art Camp (Langendorf SO) SCI Switzerland, in August. This project was about an art space, that was open to young artists, teachers, children, young people, and others interested. It offered participants various opportunities to develop their creative skills. Volunteers were able to meet and exchange ideas in an unconventional way. The project also involved the participants in planning and implementing events and activities.
- 3. Environmentally aware and Trash hunting- SEEDS Iceland, in August. This project was part of a series of projects organised by SEEDS in cooperation with different partners. SEEDS worked with and supported the Icelandic ministry for Environment and Natural Resources on a project to clean up the Icelandic coastline.
- 4. Renovate a Baroque Rectory in Semnevice INEX Czech Republic, in July. This project was oriented to build a sustainable community, support regional ecological and educational activities and revitalize the Baroque rectory. The aim of this project was to renovate the rectory and its surroundings, and enhance community spirit.



Over the duration of the project you get to know the other volunteers quite well. It was fascinating to see the changes in attitude and confidence in some of the participants. Taking part in the workcamp was an incredibly positive experience for them, and me.

IVP Online

In 2022, VSI placed 16 volunteers on a variety of online IVP projects. Online IVPs allowed volunteers to continue to connect with people from across the world during the COVID-19 pandemic. Online volunteers work together virtually for peace and social justice, and enjoy a strong focus on non-formal learning through groupwork, discussions and presentations. Below you can find details of the different projects.

- International Art Project Online SCI Germany, in March two VSI volunteers participated. Volunteers worked together and individually to create pieces of art, through which they built community and shared their thoughts on topics.
- 'Hear with your Eyes, See with your Ears': Memories of female concentration camp survivors SCI Germany, in August - two VSI volunteers participated. Volunteers analysed video interviews from the Ravensbruck Memorial Museum media collection of survivors of the Ravensbruck women's concentration camp, with the aim of making interviews more accessible to the general public.
- Teach English Language Volunteers for Peace, Vietnam, from January twelve volunteers participated Volunteers provided English classes to Vietnamese adults on a one-to-one basis to help them develop their spoken English skills.

It is extremely fulfilling to watch students gain confidence in expressing themselves over time. My students come from disadvantaged backgrounds so it's also rewarding to know that our lessons will help them in a more meaningful way such as by helping them find a better paid job in the future.

I really enjoyed getting to know my students and teaching them English. It was a very relaxed and friendly teaching environment and at times it felt more like we were sharing stories and experiences than having a class! The teaching resources that were available were a great help. I felt a bit nervous going into the programme because I didn't have so much experience in formal English teaching, but my confidence really grew! I was having a lot of fun coming up with new exercises and challenging my students. It was also heartwarming to see how much their confidence in English has grown.

EUROPEAN SOLIDARITY CORPS (ESC)

We work through the ESC programme as both a coordinating and sending organisation. VSI has been awarded a Quality Label by Léargas which recognises our ability to deliver high quality solidarity activities in accordance with the principles, objectives and quality standards of the European Solidarity Corps.

This EU-funded volunteer programme is open to 18-30 year olds, and provides young people with opportunities to get involved in the work of a wide variety of non-governmental, not-for-profit organisations, either abroad or in their home country, for between 2 and 12 months.

The programme is fully funded, with volunteers' living allowance and accommodation, travel costs, insurance and language training all covered. The voluntary activities involve a range of themes and topics including community and youth work, human rights, social inclusion, theatre, multimedia, environmental protection, sustainability, and many more. Through civic engagement, the programme aims to foster a sense of community and intercultural understanding among young people across the EU and beyond.

VSI resumed sending volunteers internationally through the programme in the autumn of 2021, and throughout 2022 we saw a steady increase in ESC volunteers going abroad. In 2022, VSI welcomed two new in-country ESC volunteers to the VSI team, to continue the work of the previous two in-office volunteers on programmes and marketing and communications, as well as one short-term ESC volunteer, who helped out across the board. GLOBAL CITIZENSHIP EDUCATION PROGRAMME

VSI received funding from Irish Aid to run a one-year Global Citizenship Education (GCE) programme with our volunteers. This was an important development in relation to our strategic plan and delivering on our goals and targets such as those set out in our self-assessment submission for the IDEA Code of Good Practice on Development Education. It has also enabled us to further embed our overall mission and values into our work.

The programme commenced in August 2022, with the aim of ensuring all VSI volunteers receive two GCE workshops - one prior to their volunteering and one after returning from their placement. In addition to that, VSI began hosting monthly meetups on topics related to global justice, with volunteers choosing the topic and facilitating the workshop. The GCE workshops and meetups were online, with one in-person meetup in 2022.

To further strengthen our progress on our strategic plan and inspired by the interest of volunteers in this years' GCE programme, VSI submitted a 3-year application for funding under Irish Aid's 2023 GCE grant, in December 2022. This will allow us to continue our GCE programme after July 2023. Meanwhile, we will continue to deliver our 2022 GCE programme by hosting monthly meetups and GCE workshops into 2023.

Global Citizenship Education Workshops

In September, we completed our first 'pre-departure' GCE workshop - 'From Volunteering to Global Citizenship: Taking the first step' - which nine volunteers attended. In October, five volunteers attended our first 'post-placement' workshop - 'From Volunteering to Global Citizenship: Next steps'. Both workshops were jointly facilitated by Áine and Eiméar, where volunteers and facilitators alike engaged in a range of thoughtprovoking activities and discussions.

Monthly Meetups

VSI hosted the first in our series of online monthly meetups in August. It was facilitated by Rebecca Labour after she attended SCI Austria's Erasmus+ project, 'Beyond Neocolonialism'. The topic was Climate Justice and Neocolonialism, and nine volunteers attended the meetup. In September, we hosted a meetup on Gender Inequality, which was facilitated by Eiméar, VSI's Programmes Officer, which ten volunteers attended.

October's meetup was in-person at the VSI office and was hosted by Bobbi O'Brien, where volunteers learned about the importance of community and community activism. The November meetup was on Climate Justice and was jointly facilitated by four volunteers from this years' Youth for Climate Justice project, with eight volunteers in attendance. We are happy with the turnout rates to our workshops and meetups in 2022, and hope to build on those as we expect our volunteer numbers to increase over time.

YOUTH FOR CLIMATE JUSTICE PROJECT

VSI repeated our online 'Youth for Climate Justice' project in November 2022 for the second consecutive year, funded by the Department of Children, Equality, Disability, Integration and Youth under their Youth Climate Justice Fund 2022.

The project featured a week of online workshops led by Áine, with the help of two participants from the 2021 project, Bobbi O'Brien and Rebecca Labour. It culminated in an in-person seminar, with 12 young people from across Ireland taking part in the project. Participants were encouraged to explore the climate crisis from a human-centred perspective, focusing on the inequalities created by climate change, nationally and globally, and recognising climate actions as part of a broader effort to reduce inequalities and poverty. Over the course of one week, they received campaign and social media skills training, developed their own climate justice social media campaigns and explored possible next steps in climate justice activism following the project. One of the stand out aspects of this years' project was the fact that two participants from last year helped facilitate it. This is clear evidence of the strong impact the Youth for Climate Justice project can have, when participants remain engaged with both VSI's work and climate justice activism. We were inspired by the enthusiasm and motivation of the young people who participated in the project - a huge thanks to you all for your hard work!

Follow-up

Participants' engagement in climate justice activism was certainly not limited to the project itself. Their online campaigns were shared widely on social media, reaching many more young people, and some of them went on to facilitate their own workshop on climate justice, after receiving professional facilitation skills training. This



two hour workshop was the VSI November monthly meetup, and was hosted by four of the Youth for Climate Justice participants. One participant became a Guest Delegate on the National Youth Assembly on Climate, and another attended an international SCI seminar in Innsbruck, Austria. Some of the participants created a book club after the project, where they met to discuss climate-related books. Finally, we delivered an online information session on volunteering opportunities with VSI for participants in December, encouraging them to get involved in other volunteer activities and to remain engaged with VSI.

Read on for a rundown of all the in-person and online events VSI staff and volunteers took part in this year.

ERASMUS+ SEMINARS

In 2022 we were delighted to be able to give our volunteers the opportunity to attend international seminars inperson after two years of online only activities.

European Youth for Global Solidarity (Beyond Neocolonialism)

This seminar was organised by SCI Austria and took place from $17^{th} - 23^{rd}$ July in Vienna. Rebecca Labour, a participant in VSI's 2021 Youth for Climate Justice Project, took part. Here's what she said about it: 'We examined terminologies surrounding colonialism, learned how to create an impactful campaign and engaged in conversations around the issue of neocolonialism. I enjoyed it a lot, it was an incredible opportunity to learn and grow.'

The Gender Effect: Training of Trainers

SCI Italy hosted this seminar from 10th - 16th April in Rome. Aine Boyle, VSI's Programmes Co-ordinator, attended, where 27 young people from across Europe met to explore, learn and develop skills in various aspects related to the theme of gender. Here's what Aine had to say about her time there: 'The training explored how we can combat gender-based discrimination in volunteering and youth projects and create safer spaces for people of all genders and sexualities. The topics we discussed during the week included gender stereotypes, sexual harassment, sexuality and consent. It was emotionally intense but also really motivating and I'm excited to work towards making our volunteer projects a safe space for everyone.'

Here's what Eiméar had to say about it: 'This week-long in-person event brought SCI branches and partners from different corners of the world together to exchange ideas and share their vision for the future of SCI. It was an inspiring week and I will stay connected with the people I met there. I look forward to seeing what the future has in store!'

Affliations

IDEA Code Network

VSI has been a member of Irish Development Education Association (IDEA) for many years and in 2021, we signed up to their Code of Good Practice for Development Education. Code members commit to strengthening their development education practice through an annual self-assessment process. VSI submitted our second self-assessment in February. The self-assessment process was a great opportunity for the VSI staff and Board to discuss and reflect on VSI's work in this area. VSI has a long history of development education, and we are committed to growing and strengthening our practice in this area, using the IDEA Code as a framework to guide us.

In June, Eiméar and Senka attended the 2-day IDEA conference, "The Future of Global Citizenship - Educating for a Changing World". This was a combination of in-person and online workshops, talks, panel discussions, and collaboration with others in the field, exploring what the future holds for Global Citizenship Education in Ireland.



NYCI membership

The National Youth Council of Ireland (NYCI) is the representative body for voluntary youth organisations in Ireland, and VSI has been a member for many years. NYCI acts as a liaison and support between member organisations and the DCEDIY regarding the Youth Service Grant (YSG). The NYCI was integral to setting-up and supporting the DCEDIY's Shared Services support for small organisations in receipt of the YSG which VSI benefits from through accountancy and governance support and training. Helen attends NYCI Heads of Organisations and Specialist Organisations meetings throughout the year. NYCI processes VSI's Garda Vetting applications for our volunteers working with children and vulnerable adults and also provides support in this area.



Comhlámh Code of Good Practice

Comhlámh nurtures, guides and mobilises development workers and volunteers to work for social justice locally and globally. VSI is a signatory to Comhlámh's Code of Good Practice, a set of standards for Irish international Volunteer Sending Agencies. Every year, VSI staff and volunteers attend Comhlámh Peer Support Meetings. Being a signatory to the Code has improved VSI's volunteer programmes, and the services and supports we provide to our volunteers.
